Food Plants as Landscape Elements

Increasingly homeowners are interested in growing food plants at home but feel constricted by their traditional home landscape design. Or, their homeowner association has restrictions on food plots. Many subdivisions would frown on a large stand of sweet corn or tomato cages in the front yard. However, by creative planning homeowners can add food plants to their landscapes while keeping the homeowner association happy

Choose the Right Plants

The key in incorporating food plants is choosing ones that will fit into the existing aesthetic of the landscape. For cool-season gardening, leaf lettuce tucked among pansies and snapdragons can be beautiful. Leaf lettuces come in many shades of green (and red!) and different textures. They aren't just tolerated in the landscape layout; their form actually adds to it! To harvest the lettuce simply cut off leaves of the plants. Or, the entire plant can be harvested and some extra mulch added to that area. No one will be the wiser. Several types of edible greens are suitable for the landscape. Collard greens can add a nice backdrop for blooming annuals. They are large plants and need plenty of growing room but they look lovely well past frost.

> Carrots are another cool-season crop that has landscape interest. Carrots are grown from seed and need even moisture as they germinate. Once they start growing the frilly carrot tops add a nice design texture to the garden. The mature tops are less than a foot tall so they easily fit into an annual bed.

> For warm-season growing peppers are a nice addition. Ornamental peppers are found at any landscape store. They add visual interest around home entryways or in small ornamental garden beds. Why not replace those with edible peppers? Varieties of jalapeno, banana pepper, and bell pepper plants mature at under two feet and can blend in nicely with other landscape elements.

> Peanuts are an underused plant in home food gardens and have merit in an ornamental garden. Peanut plants have nicely shaped leaves and yellow flowers. The plant matures at under a food tall and most varieties will spread somewhat. These are planted from seeds when the soil is warm and harvested in the Fall.

Food Gardening 101

Remember that most food crops require full sun. They cannot tolerate too much shading from other plants. Root crops, like carrots and peanuts, need loose friable soil. Also, it is important to review your pest

management strategy when adding food plants. Broad spectrum insecticides could kill needed pollinators and no one wants pesticide residue on their harvest. With just a bit of creative planning you could soon

It's That Time of Year!

t's tough to think about the new year without thinking about new year's resolutions. If you don't have any resolutions n mind this January, consider this one: Don't pour it out! We're talking about toxic chemicals, such as drain and oven cleaners, paint, and paint thinner, to name only a few. When these are poured down household drains, storm drains, oilets, or on the ground, those chemicals end up in nearby waters.

An easy way to reduce the number of chemicals that you have to dispose of, is to try to use non-hazardous products when you can. Lemon juice, vinegar, hot water, borax, soa and baking soda are good alternatives, and there are many recipes online. Our favorite this all-purpose cleaner that you can prepare and use by adding to a spray bottle: $\frac{1}{2}$ cup vinegar and $\frac{1}{4}$ cup baking soda mixed into $\frac{1}{2}$ gallon of water. You also might find that these non-toxic cleaners are not only easier on local waters but also are easier on
