

The dog days of summer are here! During extremely hot and humid weather, your body's ability to cool itself is challenged. You make even the hottest days more enjoyable by taking frequent breaks in the shade and staying hydrated if working outside. Remember to check up on the elderly, sick and those without air conditioning. Last, but not least, NEVER leave a child, a person with limited mobility or pet unattended in a vehicle. If the temperature outside is 80 degrees, the temperature inside a vehicle climbs to well over 120 degrees within a short period of time.



Speaking of planning. I have mentioned in previous notes that we are in the midst of our comprehensive plan. This plan, mandated to be updated every 10 years, is the roadmap for the City's future. When I was elected to office I quickly learned about the ten-year Comp plan because we were at the end of the previous one, so I was able to participate in that new plan ten years ago. It was very encouraging to me to hear what citizens wanted to see in Auburn and we had achieved many of those goals. When I first moved to Auburn, the downtown had a very different look. In 1992, Auburn's centennial, the officials requested that CSX return to the City the land that is now Burel Park. Citizens worked to acquire a caboose to celebrate our history of being a railroad town. The photos below show the park as it existed on the day that the caboose was delivered. Because the elected officials and citizens decided what the future of Auburn would look like, we have the beautiful park and the iconic caboose you see today.



As we continue the process of comprehensive planning, we continue to look to the future of Auburn. Growth is again headed our way and we need to be prepared. What do we want our City to look like? How do we maintain our community while welcoming new growth?

The City is currently working on a new Municipal Complex that will be ocated across Highway 8 near Auburn Elementary School. This move s necessitated for safety reasons, having City Hall and the police station ight on the railroad tracks would make it impossible for our officers to respond if there was a derailment. Any leak in the rail cars, they would have to evacuate. Watching the devastation other cities have experienced in this very situation has helped us to make this decision. Funded by SPLOST (special purpose local option sales tax), the new Municipal Complex will centralize government services such as police, court and City Hall and will open retail opportunities in downtown. The city has potential business interested in coming into Auburn every week, some are looking for space and some are building their own. It is exciting times for sure!

Current plans for the area of the new Municipal complex call for the mixed-use development of homes and retail developments that increase

the walkability of our community and retain the character of our town. We appreciate everyone who has participated in our comprehensive planning, The City of Auburn, Downtown

Development Association, DDA and citizens all look forward to seeing our community grow and prosper. Working together for the future of Auburn.

The Auburn Center is almost complete, this month we have the sprinkler system installed, floors stripped and finished and then the elevator will be installed. Once that happens we will have our Grand opening for all to come and see this beautiful historic building open once again! Watch of Facebook page and website for announces. mportant Notice! Barrow County Increases both Vastewater and Water Rates for Auburn Residents:

The wastewater rates have been increased by Barrow County Board of Commissioners. This will be reflected on your September 2018 billing. An increase for the monthly base rate for sewer will go from \$15.90 to \$16.60 or the first 2000 gallons. The usage rate will go from \$4.47 to \$5.07 per 1000 gallons over the 2000 gal usage

Barrow County has also raised the water rates for the City. This \$2 per 1000 gallons increase will also be eflected on your September bill. The rates are based on usage and are reflected below

Chief's Corner

The City of Auburn Police Department is a community police force. We love the community we serve and work hard to keep our citizens safe. This does not mean that we are only involved after a crime has been committed, when an investigation is called for or a call for medical assistance is received. We help in ways that may not be seen so easily. From keeping an eye out on the elderly we know to be alone to assisting families in need, Auburn officers use their resources to alleviate conditions that are known to give rise to public safety concerns.

Recently, we have been responding to an unusually high number of suicide calls within Auburn city limits. These are some of the hardest calls to handle. The family and loved ones of the individual are understandably devastated by the aftermath and the officers responding feel helpless Chief Chris Hodge to ease their pain. Family members often ask, "How could they have done this?" or "Why didn't I see it so I could have stopped it?". There are no easy answers to any of these questions.



According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDCP), suicide rates have increased in many communities by more than 30% since 2016. More than half of those who died by suicide had not been diagnosed with a mental health condition said Dr. Anne Schuchat, Principal Deputy Director of the CDC. "Suicide is one of the top 10 causes of death in the US right now and it's one of three causes that is actually increasing recently, so we do consider it a public health problem—something that is all around us." Schuchat said. (other causes on this list that are on the rise are Alzheimer's disease and drug overdoses). In 2016 alone, about 45,000 lives were lost to suicide.

The Auburn Police Department has worked hard to be proactive about suicide attempts and is in the process of training all of our officers on how to respond to this type of crisis. In August, one of our Corporals will complete his training to become a facilitator for suicide intervention classes so that we can offer this course to other first responders. We are also looking into other ways we can reach out to the community to help stem the tide of this epidemic. We are partnering with other organizations to reach out to our community's youth in the hopes that we might reach individuals before they do something that can't be undone.

I recently watched a clip of Kevin Hines's documentary "Ripple Effect." Mr. Hines attempted suicide by jumping off the Golden Gate Bridge—only 0.1% survive that fall. He states that the millisecond that his hands left the rail of the bridge he knew he wanted to live. We just don't know how many people have impulsively made a bad decision only to regret it once it was too late. What we do know is that many might have survived if their distress or depression had been recognized by themselves or the people around them. Studies have shown that the rise of suicide declines sharply when people call the national suicide hotline (1-800-273-TALK). There is also a crisis text line—text HOME to 741741 for free 24/7 crisis support in the US.

There is no magic wand we can waive to help someone in crisis and regrettably we know that not every single suicide can be prevented. We do know, however, that beginning a conversation about suicide is an important step. If you know someone at risk, begin the conversation, keep them safe, help them connect with the hotline or with a mental health professional, then follow up with them and let them know they are not alone. You may be the one to bring someone back from the edge. The Auburn Police Department is also here to help. Feel free to drop by for direction on available resources from our staff. Let's work together to provide our community the relief and resources they need to combat this serious issue. Thank you.
