September is World Alzheimer's Month

World Alzheimer's Month is the international campaign by Alzheimer's Disease International (ADI) every September to raise awareness and challenge the stigma that surrounds dementia. World Alzheimer's Month was launched in 2012. World Alzheimer's Day is on September 21 each year. Did you know that there are multiple types of dementia, each with their own causes and symptoms? Alzheimer's is the most well-known, but other dementias



involve the same degeneration of brain cells that is currently irreversible. Two out of every 3 people globally believe there is little or no understanding of dementia in their countries. The stigmatization and misinformation that surrounds dementia remains a global problem that requires global action.

The City of Auburn is working to become a dementia-friendly community. Teaming up with Barrow County's Senior Citizens Center, the City will be developing an awareness program for professionals and law enforcement. Many people come in contact with someone suffering from dementia and are not aware of the symptoms. Sometimes the symptoms of dementia are not recognized when they develop slowly. If you come into contact with someone who is suffering from dementia, here are some helpful hints. Remember, a person with dementia is easily confused. Try

to get the person's attention and speak clearly. Maintaining eye contact helps them focus on what you are saying. Never give too many options if you are asking a question—one or two choices is ideal. Any more than that and it may be too confusing. Break down activities into a series of steps—give the steps one at a time. If they are agitated, distract and redirect. Lastly, listen with your ears, eyes and hearts! Dementia is a terrifying disease and your care/concern may make a frightening situation easier to deal with. Teachers fulfill a vital role in the lives of our children. They not only teach, they encourage, inspire, and, at times, console. Reaching out to those they know are experiencing challenges, teachers make a huge impact on children. Many times, a decision to stay in school is based on one teacher or one mentor standing beside them. Schools need volunteers. If you can donate time, please reach out to your local school. They are always in need of mentors. For those of you who have children who are struggling, reach out for help from the school. Sometimes, all it takes is an adult in the community to take an interest and encourage them. The school system is set up to help and many times they don't see or understand the struggles your child is having.

Barrow County has a high graduation rate of 82.6% - higher than the average in

Georgia of 80.6%. This is in great part because of the great teachers and administrators in our system. Barrow County Schools work closely with the Technical College System of Georgia and local industry to train a strong work-force. Not all children will go to college so Barrow County Schools have taken innovative steps to ensure student success after high school. The Sims Academy opened in the fall of 2014 and has a focus of developing work-force ready students who can walk into high-paying industries such as robotics, culinary arts, broadcast video, and marketing while building an entrepreneurship foundation. Through a partnership with the University of Georgia and the South Korean-based company Roborobo, teachers are participating in workshops and receive training on how to best integrate robotics education into their classrooms as early as elementary school. Students are learning about robotics, showcasing their own robotics creations, and even engaging in robotics competitions at the Robotics Education Center located at Sims Academy (www.barrow.k12.ga.us).

There are so many shining possibilities in our students. Let's work together to build bright futures. "While we try to teach our children all about life, Our children teach us what life is all about." Angela Schwindt, home schooling mom.

mportant Notice! Barrow County Increases both **Wastewater and Water Rates for Auburn Residents:**

The wastewater rates have been increased by Barrow County Board of Commissioners. This will be reflected on your September 2018 billing. An increase for the monthly base rate for sewer will go from \$15.90 to \$16.60 for the first 2000 gallons. The usage rate will go from \$4.47 to \$5.07 per 1000 gallons over the 2000 gal usage Barrow County has also raised the water rates for the

City. This \$2 per 1000 gallons increase will also be eflected on your September bill. The rates are based on usage and are reflected below

Stormwater Inspections in Auburn

The City of Auburn is currently doing stormwater inspections. Homeowners that have a culvert pipe on their property may be asked to maintain the pipe outfall. Having a clear view of the pipe and no obstructions is very important for the City and the State to complete inspections. This will apply to pipe outlets outside of the right of way.

When there is no granted easements, right-of-entry, rights-of-use, or other form of dedication thereof to the city for maintenance, the property owner is responsible for the maintenance. One big change to this year's Clean Up is that it is open only to Auburn residents. State issued ID will be required to show residency in the city limits of Auburn. This means that if you pay City of Auburn property taxes you qualify. You MUST be a City resident. If you have any questions regarding this, please give us a call at 770-963-4002 to avoid any problems. Also, 4 Standard Tires can be dropped off free of charge. Over four tires, the new pricing is \$5 Standard Tire and Commercial, Tires w/Rims \$8; and \$8 Tractor Tires.
