February is also Black History month—the roots of which go back 92 years. In 1926, historian Carter Godwin Woodson, the founder of the Association for the Study of African-American Life and History, launched Negro History Week in recognition of black achievement and contribution. This has since become a month-long celebration of achievements that have been largely underrepresented in historical teachings. Did you know that the first person killed in the American Revolution was actually an African-American named Crispus Attucks? He was killed at what is now known as the Boston Massacre. Did you

know that during Reconstruction after the Civil War, African-Americans made great strides in politics? During reconstruction, 265 African-American delegates were elected, more than 100 of whom had been born into slavery. In all, 16 African-Americans served in the U.S. Congress during this time; more than 600 more were elected to the state legislatures, and hundreds more held local offices across the South. Over 2000 African-Americans held government jobs as well. Violence and new laws eventually removed these elected officials from office. It wasn't until 1967 that the next African-American was elected by popular vote to the U.S. Legislature. Today, African-Americans hold seats in every branch of government, serving their communities with pride.

I love the diversity of our community and hope that, in our children and our children's children, we will see further strides in celebrating diversity while acknowledging that we are all children of God. An Illicit discharge is defined as "any discharge into a municipal storm sewer system that is not composed entirely of stormwater." Some of the pollutants that fall into this category are:

- -Car wash wastewater
- -Gas and motor oil
- -Grass clippings
- -Household cleansers
- -Paints

- -Pesticides
- -Pet waste
- -Solvents
- -Weed Killer

Free GED Classes In Auburn

If you're among the 39 or more million adults in the U.S. who never graduated from high school, then you've probably considered getting your GED® certificate, the adult learner's alternative to a high school diploma. The GED certificate is worth considering, and it's a credential worth getting. The City of Auburn has a successful partnership with Lanier Technical Institute to offer free GED Classes to anyone 16 or over that needs to earn it.

Having the GED certificate opens up a lot of doors for advanced training. Most specialized training programs require either a high school diploma or a GED. Also with GED certificate, you'll be eligible for most workplace or on-the-job training programs, along with higher educational opportunities.

Consider the impact on your family. Your family benefits because a GED certificate is a way to increase financial security. Research also shows that once parents get a GED certificate, they're more likely to encourage their children to seek educational opportunities and complete educational milestones.

Classes are held morning and evenings in Auburn at the Auburn Center near Auburn Elementary. There is no cost to attend classes, and there are scholarships available to pay for the GED test.

English as a Second Language courses will also be available at the Auburn location. The Winder Campus will be offering Citizenship Classes too.

In addition, wildlife and the overall appearance of water ways are adversely affected by illicit discharges.

The City is working to identify illicit discharges by performing annual dry-weather outfall screenings. You can do your part and help the City of Auburn maintain an operating storm water system and healthy waterways by reporting illicit discharges. Gardening Tip from the University of Georgia

Winter is a season of waiting for gardeners. But winter is the perfect time to work on our soil. When is the last time you had a soil test? Dr. Jason Lessl gives us a refresher on why and how to soil test. Dr. Lessl writes....

One of the most fundamental, but often overlooked aspects to any successful vegetable garden, flower bed, landscape, or lawn is good, fertile soil. Getting your soil tested by a laboratory is the best and most accurate way to assess your nutrient and pH levels which are vital components of maintaining your soil. The University of Georgia Soil, Plant, and Water lab offers such services.

When you send a soil sample to a lab, you will receive a detailed report of soil nutrients levels along with crop-based recommendations on how to fix any potential deficiencies. The steps required to submit a soil sample are simple and can be achieved through a few items commonly found household items. You can start by contacting your local county extension office to acquire soil bags and get information on how to submit your samples.

Code Enforcement Update by Officer Winkler

During my patrols, I have noticed an increasing number of Auburn residents placing their grass clippings, leaves, and tree/bush limbs in the storm water drains. Please refrain from placing refuse of any kind in the storm water drains as this, over time, clogs the drains and causes

the system to overflow. Also, please be cognizant that leaves and any other type of yard material cannot be placed or blown in the roadway as this creates a hazard for motorists and eventually ends up in the storm water drains. Both described activities are a violation of our city ordinances (Chapter 8.20 and Chapter 16.38). It is the responsibility of the owner,

It is the responsibility of the owner, lawful occupant, or lessee of properties and businesses within the incorporated city limits to properly remove grass clippings, leaves, and other materials in a responsible manner.
